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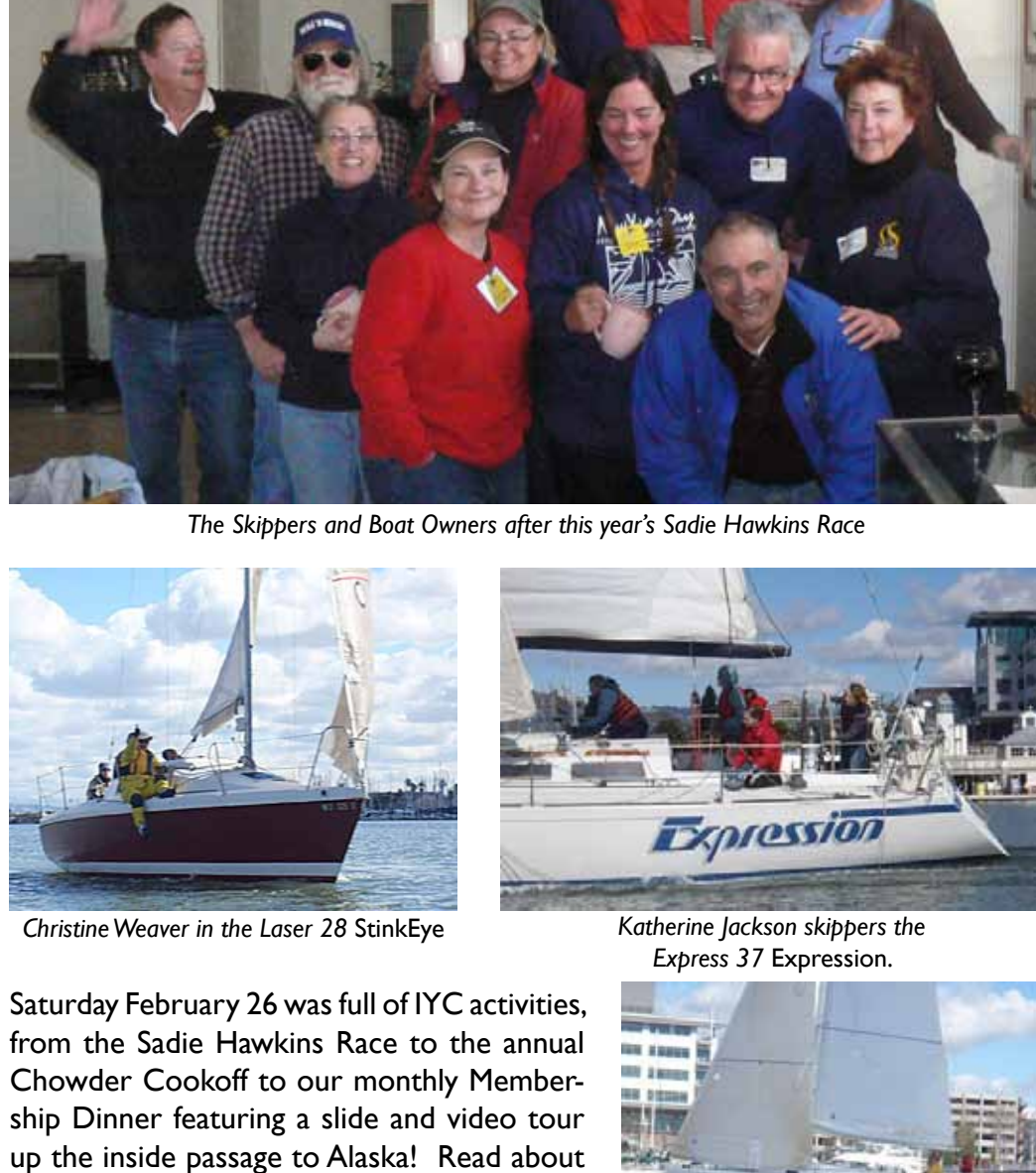
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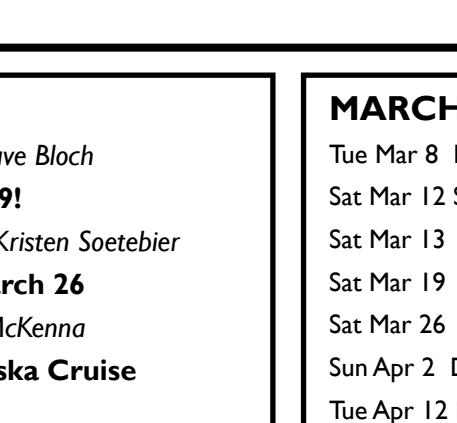

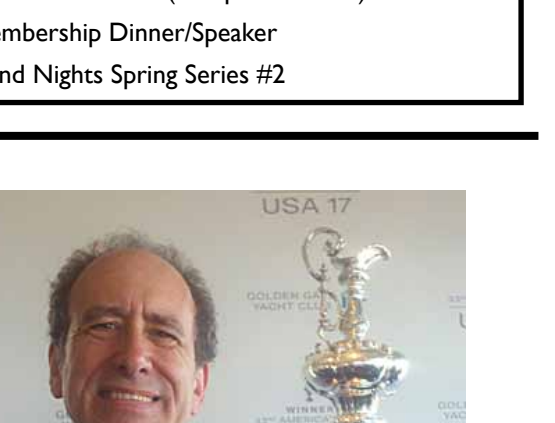

Commodore's Corner

Spring is just around the corner! I can tell because the "time to get the oil changed in Dream Catcher" bug is starting to gnaw at me. I have managed all winter to convince Speranza that anything having to do with the boat, or the Club, counts as "Going Sailing," but I'm not sure I can keep pulling that off once it really starts getting warm.

I attended the PICYA Leadership Conference on Saturday February 26 at Golden Gate Yacht Club. Believe it or not, the most exciting part of that day was not having our own AI Spector take a photo of me standing in front of the America's Cup (although that really was kind of cool). Rather, it was getting so much interesting and useful information in one day, in one place. I'm going to give you a quick rundown of what I think are some of the more interesting bits!

COAST GUARD

Captain Cynthia L. Stowe, Commander of the Coast Guard Sector San Francisco, has responsibility for 600 miles of coastline, as well as the waterways up to Sacramento and Stockton. She commands 500 active duty personnel, 43 civilians, 232 Reservists and 1568 Auxiliary. They oversee over 1,300 marine events every year, about triple any other CG sector. (Our estuary races are among those events.)

Capt. Stowe emphasized how critical it is that race applications include every piece of information that could possibly help them track a person down if a boat doesn't come back on time. When a boat is overdue, they pull out all the stops—helicopters take off, chase boats head out on searches—and they hit the phones, calling any numbers we can give them until someone says "Yes, they've shown up here and are safe." She made a special point of saying "The more numbers you give us, the better!"

America's Cup 34 is high on everyone's minds, and Capt. Stowe laid out what they're doing at the CG to prepare. During Fleet Week they use every law enforcement boat available in the Bay to cordon off a 1.5- by 5-mile area; that is "just appetizers" compared to the task they'll have protecting most of the Central Bay, from Bay Bridge to Golden Gate, during the runs of the big AC34 catamarans. They are currently writing the Special Local Regulations that will impact what we all do on the Bay for the next two years.

There will be 20 days of AC racing in 2012, and 40 days in 2013, including the final challenges September through December. They are going to need a huge fleet of volunteer boats to help them control the traffic, and will be coming to the area clubs (probably through the PICYA) to help. Capt. Stowe praised the AC team for their cooperation in getting Coast Guard messages up on the americascup.com Website. She also noted that this where anyone interested in volunteer (or paid) positions connected with AC34 can file an application.

MORE AC34

GGYC Commodore **Norbert Bajurin** gave us stories of the history of the Cup itself, and of how a shrinking and financially-unstable club was suddenly turned around as the result of a phone call he made to Larry Ellison of Oracle after hearing he was unhappy with his current club. Mr. Ellison made the short trip along the spit to GGYC, won AC33, and the club tripled in size.

GGYC also became the "eye of the hurricane" as it deals with lawyers, accountants, government agencies, the America's Cup Organizing Committee (raising \$30 million), and the AC Event Authority (raising \$270 million), the media and many others. The Commodore seems to be taking all of this in very good spirits!

He announced that there eight teams whose applications have been approved for AC34. He could not tell us who those teams are; some of them are holding back the announcements in their own countries for their own reasons. He said there could still be three or four more before the deadline March 31.

MEMBERSHIP BUILDING & RETENTION

Half Moon Bay YC Commodore Ray Drazzoz gave an excellent presentation of ideas for building and retaining club membership. Many of these are no-brainers; that doesn't mean clubs (including ours) do them all and do them well! There were a few that floated to the top for me as I listened:

- A new member coming to their first event should always be identified by the person checking in attendees at the door, and a long-time member should be right nearby to take that person and introduce them around. That member should be seated at a table with experienced members, included in the conversation and made to feel welcome. (No brainer? I can think of two organizations I joined where nobody said a word to me in the first event I attended; I never went back.)

- Members should be encouraged to join other community groups (Rotary, Kiwanis...) and/or offer to speak to those organizations at their own functions. (AC34 gives us a whole new pile of things to talk about; those organizations will not get all the info that we do.)

- Do an annual member survey so every member gets the chance to anonymously let the Board know how the club is doing. (I've been working on an online survey for a while now, and you should all be receiving an Email on that soon.)

- Do Open Houses! (I just got an invitation in my Ballena Bay Marina monthly bill, inviting me to an Open House at BBYC. Wonder if Alameda Marina would do that for us?)

There were lots more ideas. But what is really core to this is that building and retaining is not the sole responsibility of the Membership Chair! Every IYC member needs to do their part. And the feedback is very tangible: the more members we have across what we spend our fixed expenses (rent and insurance), the lower our dues can be. Simple.

IYC has a long tradition of building award-winning Decorated Boats for Opening Day! The project is incredibly creative and hugely fun, and brings some great visibility to our club.

Our Kickoff breakfast is **Saturday April 2**. Galleymeister **Brendan McKenna** has promised omelettes (!) for all who come to help brainstorm and select a theme and design! **But between now and then, I am looking for someone to be the organizer/overseer/Big Kahuna on this project.** I did this last year and it really was fun! 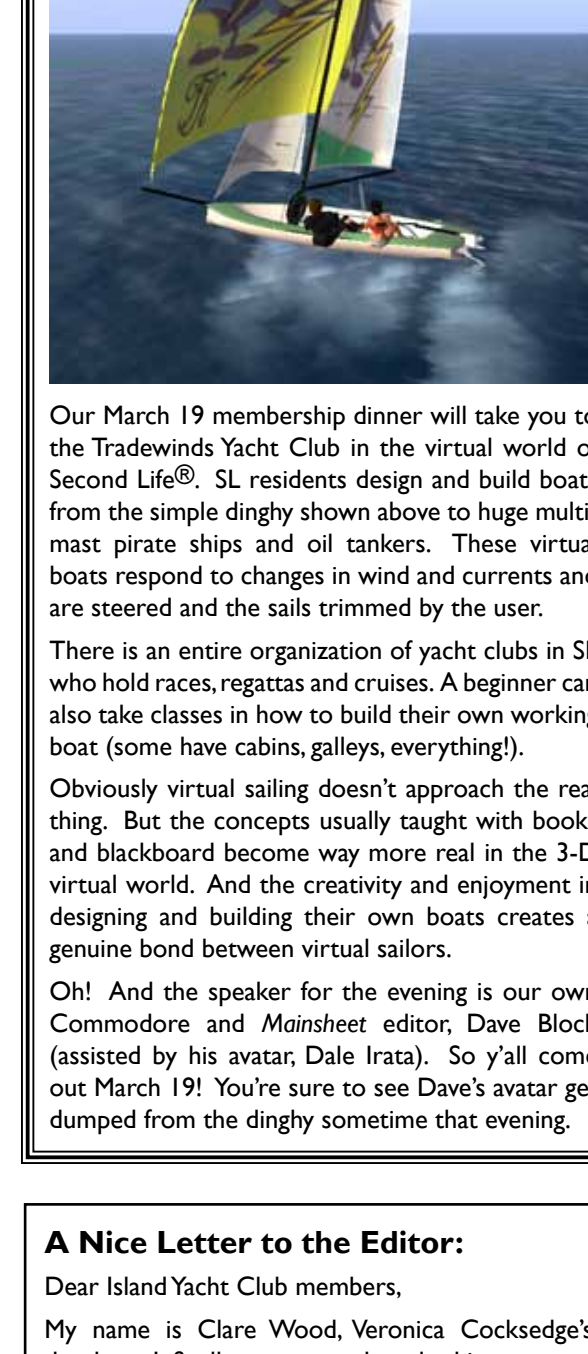
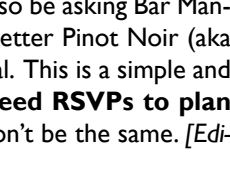
I practiced three weeks ago with someone on board but I did everything myself, then last weekend in between working nearly all weekend I managed to go out truly by myself, and the race was the next step.

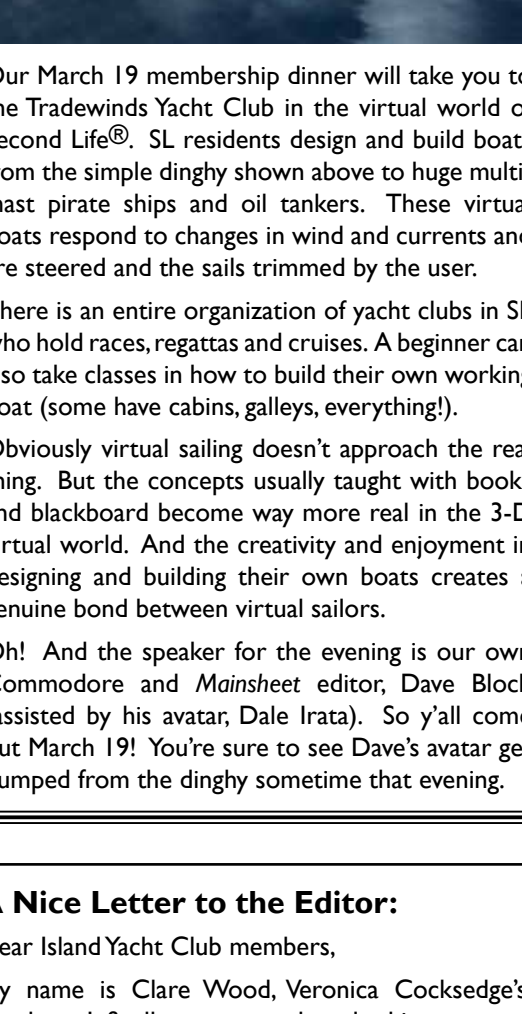

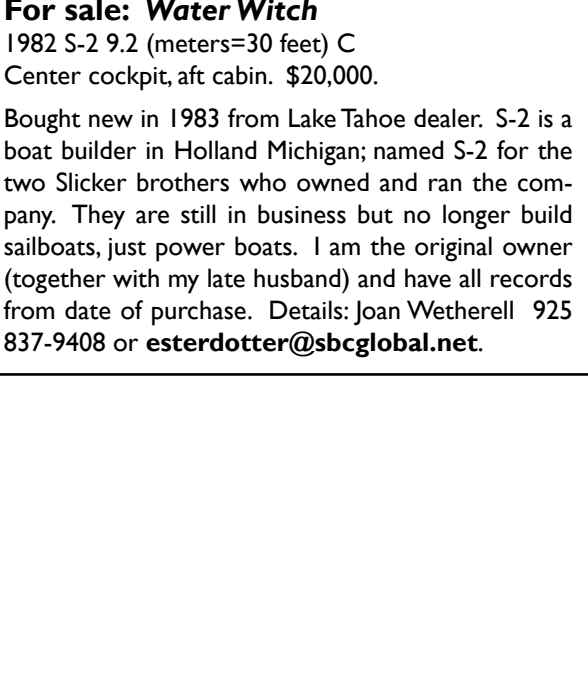

Our Feb 26 Dinner: Alaska Cruising Presentation

Guests: **Ronn Patterson** and **Richard Foregger**, **Dolphin Charters**

In 1981 Ronn Patterson formed Dolphin Charters to offer travelers a rare combination: the enjoyment and celebration of the earth's wonders and a sound natural history education. From October through late April, Dolphin Charters offers cruises in the San Francisco Bay, Sacramento River Delta, and the Pacific Ocean as well as Mexico and the Galapagos and Southeast Alaska.

One of his favorite cruising areas is the Inside Passage from Southern British Columbia to Ketchikan, Alaska. Lots of interesting characters and lifestyles as well as magnificent scenery and anchorages define the more remote reaches of this watery wilderness.

Ronn and Richard presented slides, video and their comments on cruising these Northern waters, some of the best sailing areas on the West Coast. They both hold 100 ton tickets and have extensive experience with both offshore waters and the many nooks and crannies of the East coast of Vancouver Island and Southeast Alaska.
